



Here is a lookback on World War 1 and the creation of Veterans Day! World War 1 ended on the eleventh minute, of the eleventh hour, of the eleventh day, of the eleventh month of 1918. In simpler terms, it ended at 11:11 am on November 11th, 1918. World War 1 was not only the first war of its kind, but one of the deadliest too. 40 million casualties were recorded from 1914 to 1918, plus over 20 million wounded or injured. The reason for this catastrophic war was the assassination of Archduke Franz Ferdinand of Austria-Hungary. Armistice Day was officially recognized by the U.S. in 1919, by President Woodrow Wilson as a memorial and honoring for veterans that fought in World War 1. But after World War 2, it became Veterans Day, a celebration for all veterans that have served in the American armed services. LPA celebrates Veterans Day with the Liberty Parade, where we walk out and thank all the veterans that have served and protected our freedom for this country. This year the Liberty Parade will be held on Thursday, November 9th at 8:45am.



It wasn't just the kids who enjoyed Character Day – a good time was had by all!!!









Marvelous Music



Mrs. Snyder puts a smile on everyday no matter the situation; together LPA loves and appreciates her for it.




Band and Chorus News


