



History Reflection

On December 7, 1941, Pearl Harbor was attacked by Japanese fighter planes just before 8:00 in the morning. The Japanese destroyed 20 U.S. naval vessels and 300 airplanes. 2,400 Americans were killed and 1,000 were wounded, this includes U.S. citizens. The next day president Franklin D. Roosevelt declared war on Japan, pulling the U.S. into World War II. Pearl Harbor is in Hawaii, near Honolulu. No one believed Japan would attack Hawaii with how far it is from the American mainland. The U.S. left Pearl Harbor relatively undefended, which prompted the immense disaster.

When the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor their main goal was to destroy the Pacific Fleet. The Pacific Fleet contained 9 battleships, 3 aircraft carriers, 12 heavy cruisers, 8 light cruisers, 50 destroyers, 33 submarines, and 100 patrol bombers. They wanted to do this to ensure the U.S. couldn't fight back in the South Pacific. Finally, after months of planning, the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor and the Pacific Fleet. At 8:10 that morning, an 1,800-pound bomb was dropped from the Japanese. The bomb hit the USS Arizona and the ship sank with 1,000 men trapped inside. After 2 hours, the attack was done, every battleship in Pearl harbor was damaged.





The next day, President Franklin D. Roosevelt gave a speech with the war declaration against Japan. The famous words "Yesterday, December 7, 1941 – a date which will live in infamy". Later that week, the U.S. declared war on Germany. In 1945, Germany surrendered to the allied powers. Japan would not surrender, so the U.S. were still focused on ended the war against Japan. On August 6, 1945, the atomic bomb was dropped on Japanese cities, Hiroshima and Nagasaki. This finally forced the surrender of Japan and the official end of World War II.


LPA Cheer Claims 1st Win!


