# April History Reflection: The Sinking of the Titanic

The R.M.S. Titanic, known as the Titanic, was a British ocean liner. The ship was the largest of its time, which is now a small ship compared to the modern cruise ships. The ship set sail from Southampton, England on April 10, 1912, with 2,240 passengers and crew. The ship was divided into three classes: first, second, and third. First class included many amenities such as a racquetball court, a gym, and the first ever swimming pool aboard a ship. The rooms were like staterooms we see on modern day cruise ships, except decked out with luxurious furniture. Second class had a spacious outdoor promenade, a dining room, and a library. The rooms were compact but comfortable. Finally, third class did not have many amenities and the rooms were basic and small.

The vessel was on it way to New York City; the journey was going smooth until 2:20 a.m. on April 15, 1912, when the Titanic hit a large iceberg that scraped the side of the ship which flooded the lower decks causing it to sink and later collapse. Women and children had priority for the lifeboats, but many were left stranded. With not enough lifeboats for everyone, many ended up jumping in the freezing $28^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$ waters. That day, 1,496 people lost their lives. This tragedy forever changed maritime laws. It introduced the International Ice Patrol, who alert vessels that are traveling routes in cold waters. It also introduced the Radio Act of 1912, a law that forced ships to have radios active for 24 hours in case of any dangers. The sinking of the R.M.S. Titanic on April 15, 1912, forever changed the world.
