


Teacher Spotlights – Ms. Martin and Mr. Bejarano





History Reflection - Veterans Day

Veterans Day is a federal holiday that takes place on November 11th each year in the United States. It's a celebration to honor the brave men and women who have served in the U.S. military. Veterans Day became official in 1954, when Congress passed the bill that President Eisenhower signed. But before that, Veterans Day was known as Armistice Day, because November 11th marks the day World War I ended with an armistice that went into effect on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month between the Allied nations and Germany. Armistice Day was a day set aside to honor Veterans of World War I. However, in 1954, after World War II, the Act of 1938 was amended. This changed Armistice Day to Veterans Day, a day to honor American Veterans of all wars.

Veterans Day is celebrated with parades, ceremonies, and tributes for veterans. A wellknown event on Veterans Day is the National Veterans Day Ceremony. It's held at Arlington National Cemetery in Arlington, Virginia to honor the former and current U.S. military members. The ceremony begins at 11 a.m., when a presidential wreath is laid at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, a symbolic grave for all the war dead whose remains were never discovered or identified. After the wreath laying, a color guard performs "Present Arms" at the tomb. Then, the bugler plays "taps." Lastly, a parade is held. The ceremony is free to the public to view. Another well-known event on this holiday is the New York City Veterans Day Parade. It's the largest Veterans Day commemoration in the United States, with 20,000 marchers and more than 150 vehicles.

To show thanks for the veterans' service, you can attend parades, donate, learn their stories, send a letter, or give words of gratitude to the brave veterans in your life.

- Weapons, violent scenes, and any obscene depictions are prohibited.


Judging

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
