

Character Cup Fun!



- Showing integrity


















FortifyFL was created and funded by the 2018 Florida Legislature as part of the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Act. The Office of Attorney General, Department of Education and Florida Department of Law Enforcement coordinated its development and rollout.


March History Reflection: Women's History Month



Women's History Month began as "Women's History Week" in 1978, where people in Santa Rosa, California celebrated to bring awareness to women's contributions to society. Over time, other cities began to join Santa Rosa in celebrating. In 1980, President Jimmy Carter officially declared the week of March 8th as Women's History Week and urged everyone to join celebrations. In 1987, March was declared as Women's History Month by Congress.

Even before Women's History Week, it was Women's History Day. On February 28th, 1909, the first Women's History Day occurred in New York City. This day marked the oneyear anniversary of the garment workers' strike, also known as the New York shirtwaist strike. From 1909-1910, women who worked in garment factories protested long work hours and low wage. More than 20,000 women went on strike. It resulted in gains for the garment workers, like better pay and shorter work hours.

This month honors many important women in the past, such as Elizabeth Cady Stanton (1815-1902), leader of the women's rights movement, Harriet Tubman (1822-1913), an abolitionist who saved about 70 enslaved people after escaping herself, Marie Curie (1867-1934), the discoverer of radium and its properties, Amelia Earhart (1897-1937), the first female pilot to fly by herself across the Atlantic and Pacific oceans, Malala Yousafazi (1997), a female education activist, and so many more incredible women!
